

Caroline Bradley: CLIMATE FINANCE: SPRING 2022

COURSE MATERIALS: Class materials will be available from the class blog at <https://www.blenderlaw.com/climatefinance/> .

COURSE OBJECTIVE : The seminar will introduce you to specific issues in the relationship between climate change and finance. Through work on a long or shorter papers you will develop a greater understanding of specific issues relating to the climate and finance. The aim of the class is to understand the developing environment in which financial and non-financial businesses are operating with respect to issues of climate change and finance

Most of the materials for this seminar will be policy documents, regulations or proposed regulations, criteria for sustainable financial instruments etc rather than judicial decisions.

ASSESSMENT :

Either:

1. One final paper, approximately 35 pages long (1.5 line spacing, 10-12 point font, normal margins), and properly footnoted on a topic approved by the instructor, based on an outline and at least one draft submitted to the instructor. The final paper should be submitted by the last day of Spring semester classes (April 25, 2022).

Or

2. Three 10 page papers responding to the seminar reading materials. These could be analyses and responses to single documents or to several documents; you may discuss the selection of materials with the instructor and you should submit the papers initially in draft form for review and comments. The 3 papers are due on the last day of Spring semester classes (April 25, 2022).

ATTENDANCE AT THE CLASS SESSIONS IS REQUIRED.

MASKS AND PHYSICAL DISTANCING
